
French Invasion of Ireland 1796, What if?

French/Irish and British/Irish roles and command structure. The roles and command structures are based on historic ones with a bit of poetic license (It is a 'What if?' after all...)



The above shows the command structures of both sides. Light green are Irish 'rebels', Dark green Loyalist Irish. Below is a brief overview of those structures but please don't worry if they sound like gobbledy gook as I will send out a more detailed outline for each role nearer the time! 'Aid de camps' are officers who are there to help, advice, run errands and even lead troops on behalf of the commander they are with.

British/Loyal Irish: Ireland was divided into military districts each with its own commander, there was a recently appointed Commander responsible for the interests of the newly raised Militia (though the militia was distributed amongst the various district commands) a commander responsible for the Yeomanry/orange order/any other locally raised 'defence' volunteers and an overall commander for Ireland.

The French had an overall commander who appointed a second in command (Historically Grouchy) Wolf Tone of the Society of United Irishmen was nominally second in command. Within the Society of United Irishmen Lord Fitzgerald was his equal. Samuel Nielson and Jemmy Hope were in charge of, and the main organisers of, the local Irish defence committees ('Defenders') and Society of United Irishmen local members across rural Ireland – charged with the role of disrupting the British and furthering the rebellion*.
